Research and Impact Day Speakers

Keynote Speech: The Mirage of Universality: Building a More Equitable and Effective Health System

During the keynote speech, Dr. Andrew Boozary will discuss the crucial role the health policy research community has played in saving lives during the COVID-19 pandemic, highlighting his ongoing efforts to address health inequities that lead to preventable deaths. Dr. Boozary will share learnings from the collaborative development of population health solutions which have the potential to improve policy making and ultimately drive more equitable health outcomes.



KEYNOTE SPEAKER: DR. ANDREW BOOZARY

Dr. Andrew Boozary is a primary care physician, policy practitioner, researcher, and founding executive director of the Gattuso Centre for Social Medicine at the University Health Network. He completed his medical training at the University of Toronto and health policy training at Princeton University and Harvard University. His work at the intersection of health policy, social justice and equitable health care delivery aims to improve health outcomes for marginalized populations.

During the pandemic, Dr. Boozary served as co-lead of the Ontario Health Toronto Region COVID-19 Homelessness Response and holds the Dalla Lana Professorship in Policy Innovation at the University of Toronto. He is also the founding Editor-in-Chief of the Harvard Public Health Review and served in senior advisory roles for policymakers at various levels of government both nationally and abroad on public policy issues ranging from primary care reform to the implementation of pharmacare.

Dr. Boozary has published in high-impact academic journals, and his writing and analysis appear in print and broadcast media. He has been the recipient of a number of national and international awards, and is the youngest physician recipient of the Louise Lemieux-Charles Health System Leadership Award.

Expert Panel: Social Prescribing

This year's expert panel centres on social prescribing, which involves linking patients with non-medical services to bridge health and social needs. They will explore aspects of social prescribing, including its principles, evolution, key actors, community leadership, social justice, common misconceptions and learnings, as well as the barriers and facilitators to its implementation.



PANEL MODERATOR: DR. KATE MULLIGAN

Dr. Kate Mulligan leads high-impact research and action on community leadership in health. She is an Assistant Professor in Social and Behavioural Health Sciences at the Dalla Lana School of Public Health and the Senior Director of the Canadian Institute for Social Prescribing with the Canadian Red Cross.



PANEL SPEAKER: DR. DOMINIK NOWAK

Dr. Dominik Nowak is a family doctor and health leader. In addition to his clinical practice, Dr. Nowak's mission is to build teamwork across the health system. He is a trusted advisor to leading provincial, national, and international organizations toward a health system that is more kind, caring, and careful. Dr. Nowak trained at McMaster University, where he specialized in family medicine and served as chief resident. He went on to finish a Master of Health Administration at the Institute of Health Policy, Management and Evaluation at the University of Toronto, and holds a Certified Health Executive designation by the Canadian College of Health Leaders. Dr. Nowak is currently a faculty member at the Dalla Lana School of Public Health and the Department of Family and Community Medicine at the University of Toronto. He is a recipient of the College of Family Physicians of Canada Award of Excellence for his leadership in Canadian healthcare. In May 2023, he is starting as President-elect at the Ontario Medical Association.



PANEL SPEAKER: PAUL TAYLOR

Paul Taylor is a long-time activist, non-profit leader, educator and media commentator. He is also the co-founder and principal consultant of Evenings & Weekends Consulting. For the last several years, he has also taught in the areas of organizational leadership, people resources and fundraising at Simon Fraser University. From 2017 to 2023, Paul served as the Executive Director of FoodShare Toronto, Canada's largest food justice organization. At FoodShare his leadership was consistently recognized for inspiring adoption of equity-focused people policies and practices in organizations well beyond FoodShare. Paul's experience includes Executive Director roles at Gordon Neighbourhood House and the Downtown Eastside Neighbourhood House. He has also chaired the British Columbia Poverty Reduction Coalition, served on the Board of Directors of the Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives and as Vice-Chair of Food Secure Canada. In 2020, Paul was named one of Canada's Top 40 under 40, one of Toronto Life's 50 Most Influential Torontonians and voted as Best Activist by Now Magazine readers.



PANEL SPEAKER: TAMEIKA SHAW

Tameika Shaw is Manager, Primary Healthcare Services with TAIBU Community Health Centre in Scarborough, Ontario. With the goal of improving health outcomes of clients and community, Tameika co-leads the Centre's clinic initiatives including patient access to care, building organization capacity and fostering external partnerships. Leveraging her experience in health leadership and program planning, Tameika has been responsible for implementing initiatives such as community cancer screening, community wellness initiatives and social prescribing. Tameika has acted in capacity of clinical lead for the Centre's pandemic response, which included COVID-19 testing clinics, immunization, health education, digital health and patient safety initiatives. With a career as a Registered Dietitian spanning over 14 years, Tameika understands the link between clinical and social and environmental factors on health outcomes. Tameika remains passionate in working in areas related to addressing

contributors to health inequities, especially food insecurity. Tameika obtained her Bachelor of Applied Science in Nutrition and Food at Toronto Metropolitan University (formerly Ryerson University) and holds a graduate degree in Health Sciences from the University of Toronto. She is a member of the College of Dietitians of Ontario, Community Health Centre Dietitian Action Group, Canadian Black Registered Dietitians Association and is the Board Treasurer/Secretary for the Primary Care Dietitians Association.



PANEL SPEAKER: ALTHEA MARTIN RISDEN

Althea Martin Risdien is the Director, Health Promotion at Rexdale Community Health Centre. In this capacity she oversees 35 plus programs and services. Her portfolio includes Children, Youth, Seniors, Pre and Postnatal, Parent & Child, Community Engagement Mental Health and French Language Services. Her most recent projects involved overseeing the planning and implementation of the COVID community engagement, High Priority Communities and PHAC's Black Health Programs . She is responsible for ensuring that the philosophy and mission of the organization are met in the development and implementation of all programs, services and community development activities. Althea has over 30 years' experience working in the in the not for profit sector. Prior to joining Rexdale Community Health Centre, she was the Executive Director of a community-based organization serving the North Etobicoke Community. In addition, she has served on a number of community boards and committees including Reconnect Mental Health Services where she was a member of the finance committee and the chair of the nominating committee, as well as a member of the United Way of Greater Toronto's Program Evaluation Taskforce.

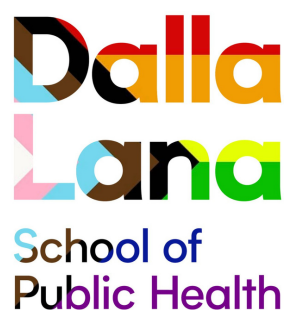
